

#### **Express Care**

We continue to receive positive feedback regarding express care at NLH and are thrilled this service is filling a void in our region. Express Care is an emergency room type B, which is different than a walk-in, non-emergent clinic or urgent care service. This allows us to provide a higher level of care, including the ability to transition patients to our emergency department if necessary. One of the greatest benefits is that the medical records of patient visits are integrated with records held by NLH and Dartmouth Health providers in primary and pediatric care. This allows for a seamless transition of care if follow-up is required. Express Care is staffed seven days per week (with the exception of a few holidays).

## Providing whole child healthcare

The Pediatric Care team is committed to collaborative care that treats the whole child. With a shortage of mental health providers statewide, NLH providers are filling the gap in addition to meeting physical healthcare needs.

"We are able to help parents get their children the mental healthcare they need," Kalpakgian says. "Our providers can perform the initial screenings for certain diagnoses, such as Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), depression and anxiety, and we can assist with prescribing necessary medication until a mental health provider is secured."



## Preparing for winter illnesses

With children back in school, the Pediatric Care team is seeing increased respiratory illnesses. They advise parents to ensure their children are eating healthy foods, sleeping enough, getting exercise and using good hand washing techniques. Children should also receive a flu shot every fall and be up-to-date on their COVID-19 vaccines.

"The COVID-19 vaccine has proven to be safe. I've given it to all three of my children and they did great-with minimal side effects," shares Lozman-Oxman. "Getting vaccinated and boosted is such a priority. The more people of all ages who are vaccinated, the safer our community becomes."



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
